Loneliness: Know His Nearness Megan Jung

Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need. — Hebrews 4:15-16

There are different experiences of loneliness: the garden variety kind, the complicated kind, and then there's debilitating loneliness. Everyone (and I mean everyone, not just you) will face all kinds of loneliness in her life. If you are like me, loneliness is often accompanied by shame, isolation and felt powerlessness. It can be immobilizing, sometimes feeling like an endless cycle of doubt and separation. We are prone to withdraw, but God's Word permits and compels us to move toward Him. This is hard. Movement is often the last thing we want to do when we're any kind of lonely—general or acute.

Traditionally, we need permission to approach authority figures: permission to approach the judge's bench, chain of command with bosses, proxy cards. In Hebrews, however, the King of kings invites us to confidently approach His throne. This is not without permission. Jesus died for us, giving us His right to approach our Holy Father.

Whether it be a move or loss of a loved one, loneliness (with the help of sin and Satan!) tries to convince us of many lies, including misplaced hope and feeling like we don't belong. Throughout the Bible, we see loneliness: Israelites in exile, Naomi, David, even Jesus at times. Loneliness is a normal ache until Jesus comes back. While we wait, we can combat loneliness's lies. We are who God says we are: His chosen children who belong to Him. While some loneliness is relieved and some lingers, God *always* comes to His people and offers His presence. A safe presence is the very thing we long for most when we are lonely.

Ask the Lord to give you good things like relationships that allow you to know Him better. Ask for help to move *toward* rather than *away*. When there is no relief, may you know Him better *through* loneliness. While it is painful, we can take our longing to Him. Ask Him for the mercy of satisfaction in knowing the King of kings has chosen to be with you forever and will never, never leave you or forsake you.
