



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Big Picture Perspective A letter from Karen Hodge

Welcome to our annual Women's Ministry Leadership Training. We would be delighted to serve you both this weekend and as you return home. Many of you arrive simultaneously excited to learn but overwhelmed and discouraged by ongoing ministry challenges. Let's face it: on any given week as women's ministry leaders, you are confronted with a myriad of issues such as:

- You get a text from a young single woman on the edge of burnout, wondering if her work as a doctor makes any difference.
- You take a walk alongside a baby stroller and a young mom struggling with postpartum depression.
- You sit across from a brand-new believer in a small group who comes each week with a tender and teachable heart, excited to study the Bible.
- You connect with a grieving widow in the hallway on a Sunday morning, who tearfully wonders how long grief will feel like a heavy winter coat.

What do you say? How can you help? You may feel out of your depth for a word of truth and encouragement. Both you and the women you encounter are sharing from a frame of reference for their joys or sorrows. Is it cultural norms, feelings, past church experience, or information from the internet? Women's Ministry is the gospel classroom where we help ourselves and women; we serve to reframe the narrative of their lives within the redemptive narrative of Scripture.

So, through the power of the Holy Spirit, you can remind your single friend that Creation tells us that work is sacred and fulfills the cultural mandate to spread His glory. You take one more step alongside your young mom, who feels bruised and broken by the Fall. You listen with delight as you see gospel transformation in the heart of a new disciple of Christ because of Redemption. And you extend a hug filled with hope, lifting her eyes to the Consummation of all things, remembering that death is an enemy, but there will be no more tears or sadness in Heaven.

Reframing the narrative brings hope, joy, and needed perspective. It is our prayer that you will leave with those gifts to share with others this weekend as we marinate in the Big Story of the Bible together!

Women's Ministry 101 — Susan Hunt and Marcie Tuten

Do you want a Word-based, relationally-driven women's ministry that disciples women to think biblically and live covenantally? Do you want to be a life-giving leader who builds a unified team? Do you want the characteristics of covenant life to characterize your women's ministry? Too often we start in the wrong place when we think about women's ministry. We must begin with the foundational truths of covenant (how we are bound to the Father), church (how we are bound to each other as believers), and our creation as women. As these transforming truths renew our minds, they inform and impact what we do, why we do it, and how we do it. By God's grace we will live covenantally, ministry will flourish, and our churches will be healthier.

Church: Living Out the Story Together — Courtney Denton, Tatiana Anderson

Do you ever think of your church as God's gift to you and do you think of His people as conduits of His divine grace, love, and mercy? It can be tempting to overlook the importance of the Church as a body of believers saved by grace through faith and focus mostly on what we "do" on Sundays. Rather, church is who we are and how we live in relationship with God and each other. Our perspective on church shapes and informs how we equip, encourage and care for our women. Join us as we explore the covenantal blessing of being united to each other through One Big Story of Redemption and the implications for how serve in our women's ministries.

2. Titus 2:1, 3-5: Foundational verse for Women's Ministry in the church

Titus 2:1, 3-5—But as for you teach what accords with sound doctrine... Older women likewise are to be reverent in behavior, not slanderers or slaves to much wine. They are to teach what is good, and so train the young women to love their husbands and children, to be self-controlled, pure, working at home, kind, and submissive to their own husbands, that the word of God may not be reviled.

Westminster Larger Catechism A. 4: The scriptures manifest themselves to be the word of God, by their majesty and purity; by the consent of all the parts, and the scope of the whole, which is to give all glory to God...

3. Characteristics of the covenant

Westminster Confession of Faith, Ch. VII, Of God's Covenant with Man
The distance between God and the creature is so great, that although reasonable creatures do owe
obedience unto Him as their Creator, yet they could never have any fruition of Him as their blessedness
and reward, but by some voluntary condescension on God's part, which he hath been pleased to
express by way of covenant.

Covenant is the way God comes near to be with and to redeem His people.

Covenant is the promise that secures our relationship with the Triune God, so it helps us understand our place and purpose in redemptive history including our creation design and redemptive calling as men and women.



The covenant is sovereignly initiated and sustained. "For this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, declares the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts. And I will be their God, and they shall be my people" (Jer. 31:33).

Covenant is relational. God designed and created us to live in relationship with Him. He redeems us to restore that relationship. He adopts us into His family so we are united to one another. It is not just an idea to understand; it is a way of life.

The covenant is transformative. The Holy Spirit transforms us from one degree of glory to another (2 Cor. 3:18) so we increasingly reflect His glory to each other.

Covenant is familial. From the beginning God worked through a family. The story begins with a garden wedding (Gen. 2:22-25) and a command to be fruitful and multiply (Gen. 1:28), and it will end with a marriage supper (Rev. 19:9).

Covenant is corporate. The family became a family of families, a nation of God's covenant people who are to live in community with one another.

Covenant is generational. Throughout the Old Testament one generation is commanded to tell the next generation. Then, before His ascension, the resurrected, victorious Jesus expands the command and repeats the promise: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations... And behold I am with you always" (Matt. 28:18-20).

Covenant is compassionate. God is a God of compassion and we are to be a people of compassion.

Covenant is integrative. It is the thread that holds Scripture together and shows its purpose, continuity and connections.

Covenant is the guarantee of our "inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, who by God's power are being guarded through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time" (1 Pet. 1:4-5), so it empowers us to live in the reality that we are "heirs according to promise" (Gal. 3:29).

As you pray and plan for life and ministry ask:

How can these characteristics be reflected in our Women's Ministry? How can they be reflected in my life?

4. Ephesians 1: THE COVENANT OF REDEMPTION

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Case Study Part One:

Beth and her family moved to a new city across the country in the fall before the global pandemic. The move was stressful for the family and Beth was overwhelmed with finding the right school for her three kids and getting plugged into the new community. While she wanted to find a church with solid biblical teaching, women's Bible study, engaging youth group and opportunities for her family to get connected, she struggled to navigate all the changes at once. She missed her old church and the friendships she's established over the years. The move left her disconnected and lonely, often wondering if she would find community and friendships again. She was floundering as she tried to care for her family and find meaningful connections. Deep down Beth wanted to find a place to belong and for her family to be known and welcomed. With her husband traveling for work most days during the week, the weekends became the only time for the family to be together. Both she and her husband exhausted, they didn't have much margin to look for a church and put that decision off for the following week. As the weeks went on, Beth felt more disconnected and lonely.

Discussion questions:

Have you ever felt like Beth? What has encouraged you to move towards community, instead of isolation?

Case Study: Part Two

One evening, when Beth's family was having dinner at home, a neighbor stopped by with a welcome basket to meet Beth's family. Julie, a recently widowed older woman, lived several houses down from Beth. Julie was kind and friendly, and she was the first person to welcome Beth in her new city. Julie spent focused time getting to know Beth and her family, and she became a regular visitor in their home. The holidays were approaching, and Julie knew that Beth missed her old church and friends, and she invited Beth to attend a women's Christmas gathering at her church. It had been several months since Beth and her family had been to church and she was nervous about going with Julie. She wondered, "How will I get plugged in? Will there be a way for me to serve? Will I be accepted there?"

Beth met many kind and welcoming women at the gathering and her family attended that church the following Sunday. She decided she wanted to get involved with the women's ministry there and reached out to Julie for help. Beth quickly discovered that there wasn't one person who coordinated women's ministry, but a team of women, with Julie being one of the co-leaders. Julie helped Beth navigate getting involved in serving the church and using her gifts to bless others.

Discussion questions:

What is one or two ways your church and your Women's Ministry provide access points for new people to be welcomed? How does a team-based model rather than a positional leadership model allow more opportunities for women to become engaged?

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Case Study: Part Three

As Beth continued to attend the church, worship, and grow in God's Word, she became more connected with Julie and other women, and got involved with serving in the Women's Ministry. Beth got to know the stories of the women she served alongside on a deeper level and learned about God's work in their lives through various challenging and joyful situations. Getting connected to a body of believers, remembering the value and the blessing of gospel-filled community, and finding ways to love and serve the church helped Beth to flourish in the place where God had her in that moment in her life's story.

God continued to work in Beth's heart by deepening her understanding of what the church is and renewing her love for God's people. She decided to invite a group of moms from her son's school over for coffee and get to know them. One of them was having a particularly challenging time with her daughter and felt discouraged and lost. Beth knew that her friend could use encouragement and support. She shared the hope of Christ with the mom and invited her to church.

Discussion questions:

• What is one take away principle you can use to encourage the women at your church to live intentionally as a light for the gospel in their homes and neighborhoods?

Questions to consider:

- 1. How has your view of the church expanded in light of God's presence in community?
- 2. How are the women in your church practicing sharing in one another's gifts and graces?
- 3. How is your women's ministry developing community with women in the church and how is it extending the borders of community to women outside of the church?

Big Question: How does God ask me to use my words for good? How am I tempted to use my words for either my good or in sinful ways?

Case Study One: Gossip

Linda comes to Bible Study every week ready to learn and invest in the women she encounters. She makes sure everyone in small group is welcomed and included. But when it comes to prayer time at the close of small group, Linda uses her "prayer requests" to gossip about her community. Anya, the small group leader and new mom, is much younger than Linda, a retiree and grandmother. Anya is grateful for Linda's inclusion of all members of the group but doesn't know how to wisely encourage Linda to respect others.



Case Study Two: Criticism

Emma has recently become the Women's Ministry Coordinator at her church and is seeking to lead the women in her church in a godly way. She loves her job and caring for the women in her community. After prayerfully considering and discussing with her women's ministry team, Emma decided to change the long standing Women's Christmas Brunch to a multigenerational Christmas Craft Night. Emma and the team felt the new event was life giving and encouraging to women of the church. But a few days after the event, Sonia and Zuri confronted Emma after Sunday morning worship explaining they found the event to be frivolous. Sonia and Zuri said they appreciated Emma's hard work but wished they could have had an event that pushed the women to dwell on advent and God's word. Emma feels defeated, embarrassed and confused. She isn't sure what to do with this complaint.

Case Study Three: Conflict

Teresa is the Women's Ministry Coordinator at her church and has begun to dread her Women's Ministry Meetings. Her team is made up of mostly her best friends plus a few big characters. Teresa finds it very difficult to work in particular with Angelica, the event's coordinator on her team. Angelica is a really big personality. Teresa values her input, but she feels frustrated as Angelica dishes out advice endlessly and doesn't give everyone a chance to voice their thoughts. Teresa doesn't know how to lead Angelica well and feels stuck. Teresa just wants to avoid Angelica but that isn't working. And Teresa's best friends complain and ask her to fix Angelica talking too much in the meetings!

Case Study Four: The Words We Don't Say


Elizabeth is a member of the working moms' small group that meets once every two weeks over her lunch break. The group's purpose is to connect working moms, build community, and be a place to talk about success and struggle among God's people. Elizabeth loves this group and gravitates toward her close friends in the group. Elizabeth is so tired and worn out; she wants to come to the group and be poured into. She knows she needs to encourage and pour into others too, but she just doesn't have the energy! Elizabeth endlessly feels guilty about building up her own relationships in the group and her unconcern for those in the group without friends. She keeps telling her husband how she feels bad about it, but she has made no move to change.

Scripture passage: 2 Corinthians 4:1, 5-18 ESV

Therefore, having this ministry by the mercy of God, we do not lose heart.

⁵For what we proclaim is not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, with ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake. ⁶For God, who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. But we have this treasure in jars of clay, to show that the surpassing power belongs to God and not to us. ⁸We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be manifested in our bodies. ¹¹For we who live are always being given over to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus also may be manifested in our mortal flesh. ¹²So death is at work in us, but life in you.

¹³ Since we have the same spirit of faith according to what has been written, "I believed, and so I spoke," we also believe, and so we also speak, ¹⁴ knowing that he who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and bring us with you into his presence. ¹⁵ For it is all for your sake, so that as grace extends to more and more people it may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God.

¹⁶ So we do not lose heart. For the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal.

Securing Your Next Guest Speaker

Questions to consider: Questions your team should know before you make the call.

- What is the purpose of the event?
- Does the speaker have certain topics they have already developed or will you ask them to develop a topic?
- What do you hope will happen as a result of this event?
- How does this speaker's content help you advance the spiritual formation of your women? Will it complement the overall mission and vision of your church?
- What are the speaker's theological convictions?
- What is your budget for a speaker?
- Does this speaker have a set fee?
- What are your women currently studying? What is the current sermon series?
- What is your intended audience? (Christian/Non-Christian or mixed, young girls, older women, young moms)
- What is the schedule of your event? Are you open to the speaker's input on this?

Communication is key: Hints towards building a relationship with a speaker.

- Prayer is one of the most important aspects of communication. Ask early and often about how you can pray for the speaker.
- Assign one person to be the point person for all vital communication by writing, phone or email.
- Communicate in writing exactly what you are asking a speaker to do and any deadlines for publicity or travel arrangements that are needed.
- Discuss travel arrangements early: Will they travel by air? Do they have a frequent flier account? Will they make their own arrangements and be reimbursed or will the team make the arrangements? Will there be someone to pick them up from the airport and if so, how will they connect? Will they be driving and will you reimburse mileage? Make sure to give them detailed directions. Take into consideration whether the speaker is traveling between time zones.
- Setting an honorarium: Consider the number of times they will speak, preparation time, travel time, and any other costs that would be involved.
- Send the speaker all event publicity pieces.
- Will the speaker have handouts that need to be copied?
- Do they have any audio/visual, equipment or teaching tools needs?

Care for the speaker: Caring for you speaker will yield big benefits

- Assign a few women to care for the speaker prior to the event through prayer and sending notes of encouragement.
- While onsite, have those same women as liaisons to care for the immediate needs of the speaker: getting water, problem solving, etc.
- Does the speaker have a preference on where they will stay, in a home or hotel?
- What are some of the speaker's favorite things? Perhaps prepare a gift basket with favorite snack or drinks
- Make sure to follow-up with thanksgiving and helpful feedback for the speaker.

Using this Rubric:

Things to Consider While Evaluating Curriculum

One of the reasons to evaluate curriculum is to see the strengths and weaknesses of each material. Curriculum is designed to act as a guide, tool and resource for navigating God's people through His Word. Keep in mind fallible human beings who all have various gifts and strengths in creating this material (i.e., theological, educational theory, ability to apply to everyday life) have produced what is to be evaluated.

These five categories in this rubric are to be used as a grid to aid in allowing God's leaders in His church to better evaluate what is needed for their particular church context, philosophy of ministry, and desire for the study of God's Word.

- 1. Whole Person Learning: God designed human beings as image bearers of Himself. Therefore, we learn intellectually, emotively, and by volition. God's people grow in spiritual maturity in each of these domains. This category allows us to see the curriculum's emphasis or lack thereof.
- Diverse Methodology: Different methods offered in curriculum allow for learning to occur in a variety of ways. Depending on the purpose of the curriculum/study there may be a need for more or less methodology.
- 3. Learner Motivation: This category can aid in understanding how much additional encouragement may be needed for the learners to engage with the material.
- 4. Theological Framework: This category is designed to allow the leaders to determine how much emphasis and priority is given to theological instruction. An additional teacher and/or resources may be needed to adjust a theological perspective that may differ from the PCA, but the curriculum itself has great strengths in many other categories.
- 5. Gospel Application: The desire is to utilize curriculum that points the learner to a Spirit and grace-oriented life application. This category aids to measure how the leaders may additionally need to emphasize or challenge a particular curriculum.

Other questions to consider while evaluating:

- 1. What is the primary purpose of this curriculum?
 - a. To foster spiritual maturity/formation?
 - b. Relational and community building?
 - c. Theological training?
 - d. All of the above?
 - e. Other?
- 2. How will church leaders and participants view this curriculum? As a tool, guide or resource? All three? None?
- 3. Will supplemental teaching, information and/or materials be needed to strengthen this curriculum?
- 4. What relationships might be challenged from using this curriculum? [i.e., church leaders, participants, others in the community]
- 5. What relationships might be strengthened from using this curriculum? [i.e., church leaders, participants, others in the community]
- 6. How does this curriculum fit within the local church values and leadership? Does it promote the values and leadership? Could this curriculum bring discord among the leadership and participants?

Diagnostic Questions:

- 1. Why are we doing this?
- 2. How will this glorify God by reflecting his character?
- 3. What is this teaching women about the Biblical perspective of womanhood?
- 4. What is this teaching woman about living covenantally and reflecting grace to one another?
- 5. Does this activity or task flow from Scripture?
- 6. How will this activity build community among women?
- 7. How will it build community with other members, age groups, and ministries of the church, presbytery, and denomination?
- 8. How does this extend the boundaries of the community to enfold those outside the church?
- 9. How does this demonstrate the compassion of Jesus?
- 10. Will what we do and how we do it give life to our church or suck life from it?
- 11. How are we showing our answers to the above questions to participants in the ministry so they understand why we do what we do?

Every activity will not accomplish all of the above, but each should accomplish some of the above.






Interested in building your Women's Ministry from the ground up?




Year One:

Year Two:

Read and Discuss: <u>Life-giving Leadership</u> by Susan Hunt and Karen Hodge. This is the "how" of complementarian leadership. Life-giving leadership is grounded in God's Word, filled with the purpose of glorifying God, relationally driven and decidedly different than anything the world teaches us about leadership. Practical, inspiring, and filled with stories of women, like you, who want to know how to lead in a way that reflects Christ.





Presbytery: A regional body that oversees the work of ministers and churches in an area. There are 88 Presbyteries.
